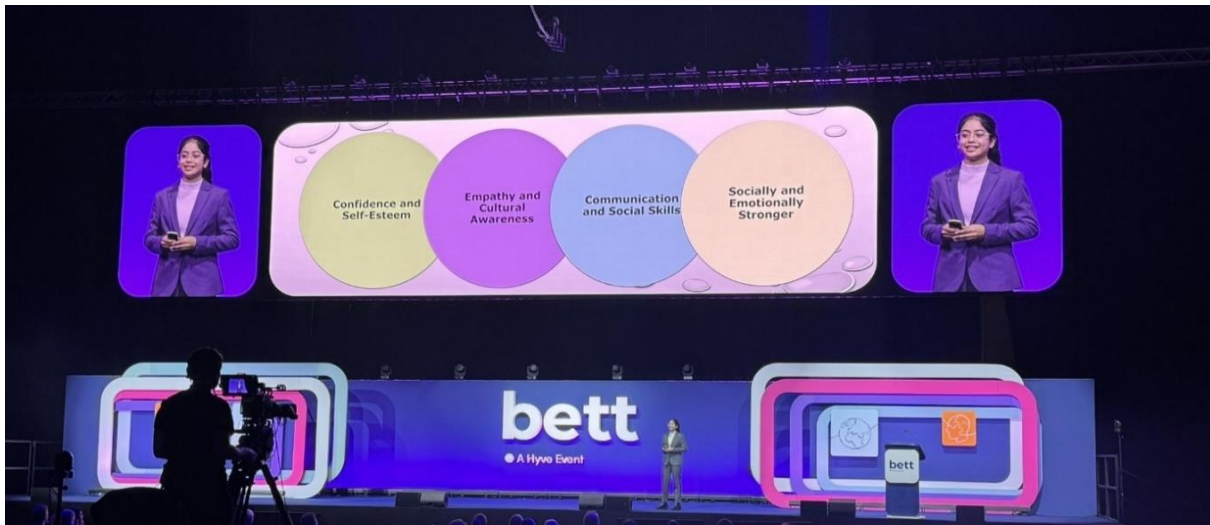


Youngest Student Keynote Speaker, Satyan Namya Joshi, Inspires Global Audience at Bett 2024 held at London
